



Getting started with 2 Kings

Is God really in control? Does He really care? How did it all end up like this?

Those must have been the kind of questions going through the minds of the first readers of 1&2 Kings (the two books sit together.)

They found themselves in Babylonian exile, Jerusalem destroyed and the temple trashed. How? Why?

The writer of Kings tells Israel's history from God's perspective.

1 & 2 Kings are, unsurprisingly, about Kings. They cover the segment of history when Israel had kings, 970-586 B.C, following on from 1 & 2 Samuel where we read about Israel's first kings, Saul and David.

1 & 2 Kings are selective, covering a lot of ground with a particular focus on the leaders of God's people.

The key to ruling justly and wisely is obedience to God's Word. **1 Kings 2v1-4** is absolutely crucial for understanding these books, alongside **2 Kings 17v7-23**.

Read those two sections to get a sense of where the books are going...

When the leaders of God's people fail to obey God's Word and worship Him wholeheartedly, the people quickly follow in their footsteps. The painful exile that the first readers were experiencing was due to their wickedness and idolatry – they were reaping the curses that God had promised back in Deuteronomy 28. Far from being out of control, God is actually carrying out exactly what He promised. He is the One in complete control of nature and history.

God's people need a King who will rule wisely and justly as he listens to and obeys God's Word.

Jesus in 2 Kings

- Jesus fulfils so much of the Old Testament imagery and characters. For example, He is the ultimate Temple – the meeting place of God and man, where God comes to live with His people.
- Prophets speak God's Word to the people. Jesus IS the Word to the people – the ultimate revelation of God.
- 2 Kings ends with hope – the people are in a right mess, but the kingly line is not snuffed out. Both books ache with hope for a people far away from God – God is still in control, and there is King who will rule justly and wisely as He perfectly obeys God's Word.
- Jesus is the King crowned with thorns so that we could be welcomed into the Royal Family.

- What did you learn about Jesus and what it means to trust him? (Luke 24:45-47)
- What did you learn about yourself? (James 1:23 & 2 Tim 3:16-17)
- How were you corrected or rebuked or equipped for every good work? (2 Tim 3:16-17)
- What did you learn from the book that will help you keep going as a follower of Jesus? (Romans 15:4)
- What did you learn that will help you serve and build up the church? (Eph 4:11-16)
- What have you learnt that helps you love the Lord your God with all your heart & with all your soul & with all your mind? (Matt 22:37-40)
- What has helped you love your neighbour as yourself? (Matt 22:37-40)
